## MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF STAFF

It is my honour to have the opportunity to address you in my role as interim chief of staff, a position I assumed in May 2021.

We are now well past the one-year mark in our fight against COVID-19. We have all watched as the pandemic has led to sweeping changes across healthcare. This ranges from the massive expansion of virtual medicine, to many new safety protocols and procedures, to changes in physician movement and work patterns.

COVID-19 has certainly brought many challenges. Over this past summer, we have grappled with unprecedented physician staffing shortages for hospital and community services. We have worked closely with Sioux Lookout Regional Physician Services Inc. (SLRPSI) in rapid, emergent recruitment to prevent closure. It is a huge testament to the team that we have managed to prevent any hospital closures as a result of physician staffing. A large number of first time locum physicians worked in the facility over this summer, and many took the time to comment on their positive experience; many plan to return. Going forward, this crisis has led to new protocols and procedures being developed and put in place for similar emergency situations in the future. We have also standardized processes for physician orientation to the hospital.

The pandemic had temporarily put on hold the hospital programs for visiting specialists. These services have now begun to resume going forward. It has been encouraging to work with a number of new specialists who are interested in coming to SLMHC for the first time, and thus be able

to expand the services available locally. We also continue to work on expanding the delivery of virtual care for regional specialists in order to enhance services to our patients. Finally, we continue to partner with SLRPSI to advocate to the Ministry of Health with respect to the need for permanent, Sioux Lookout-based specialists going forward.

The team of physician leaders at our hospital have all been actively involved in expanding and strengthening services in their respective departments throughout the pandemic. The emergency department and mental health and addictions department, in particular, are in the process of very promising future planning.

We truly are a unique organization. We have inherited a powerful history and legacy. Having taken the time recently to once again carefully read over SLMHC's Mission, Vision and Values, I am excited to be reminded of what we represent and what we are accomplishing. During my time in this role, I have welcomed the opportunity to continue to build on the foundation of quality of care and patient safety at our hospital, and will continue to do so going forward.

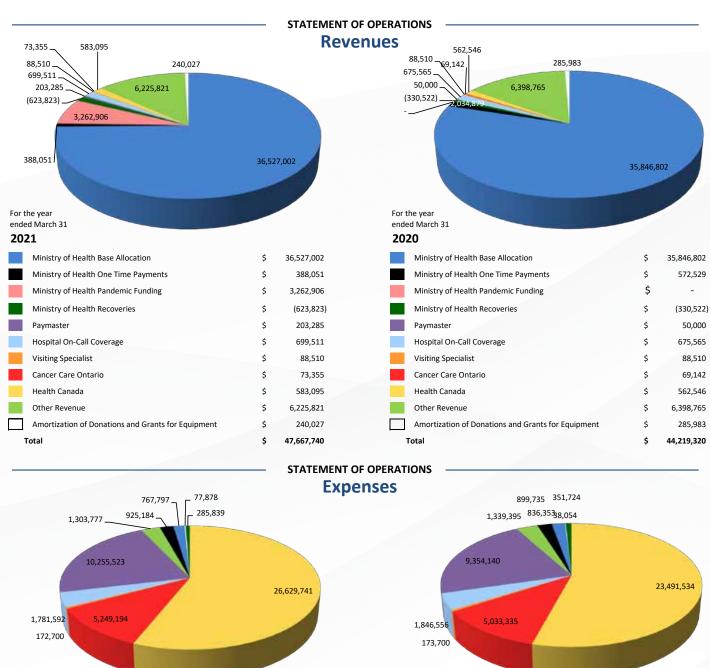

The first part of January 2021 was important for the fight against COVID-19 in our region! Residents of William A. George Extended Care and health care staff were among the first to receive the vaccine during the first phase of the vaccination roll-out plan for the province. On the evening of January 5, SLMHC's leadership (President and CEO, Heather Lee, joined by Director of Clinical Support Services, Karen Parent) met with ORNGE and Thunder Air staff to receive the first cooler with the Moderna vaccine. It was securely brought to the SLMHC laboratory where the next day staff administered first doses to residents and staff.



It was an historical moment when SLMHC administered the first COVID-19 vaccine at William A. George Extended Care Facility to resident and Elder Eunice Fiddler, 85. Residents and health care workers were the first to receive the vaccine in our region during the roll-out of the vaccination plan.



Throughout January and February, SLMHC was busy administering COVID-19 vaccines to residents, staff and physicians. Thank you to our team who stepped up to run the vaccine clinic and helped SLMHC fight back in the pandemic.

This allowed us to screen everyone for COVID-19 and reduce the opportunty for any outbreaks in our facilities; Every area of SLMHC was subject to more intense cleaning and sterilization. Our rehab team worked hard to wipe down equipment and stay on-top of keeping the department clean and safe for patients; To ensure we were able to provide top-notch health services in our COVID-19 in-patient unit, our health care team came up with special crash carts to ensure that each space had the tools they needed and there was no need to leave/re-enter a sterile space.

# MESSAGE FROM THE SLMHC FOUNDATION

The Sioux Lookout Meno Ya Win Health Centre Foundation has faced a challenging year, as have most charities, due to COVID-19. Our two main fundraisers had to be cancelled in 2020, the Bearskin Airlines Charity Golf Tournament (and in 2021) and the Bearskin Airlines Skip to Equip Curling Classic, as people were not allowed to gather.

We explored an alternative fund raising route, an online 50/50 draw with a license for 12 draws. We began in November 2020 and will end in November 2021. To date, we have awarded over \$270,000.00 in prizes and have been able to commit just over \$200,000.00 to Sioux Lookout Meno Ya Win Health Centre. We are very thankful to the businesses and individuals who chose to "seed" some of these draws. We also
